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<p><i>Name:</i> Llama <i>Latin name:</i> Lama Glama <i>Interesting fact:</i> The Incas of South America use Llamas as a beast of burden. <i>I eat:</i> Grasses. <i>I live in:</i> South America; Peru, Chile and Bolivia. <i>My endangered level is:</i> Domesticated</p>	<p><i>Name:</i> Mandarin Duck <i>Latin name:</i> Aix Galericulata <i>Interesting fact:</i> Mandarins nest in holes in trees; the ducklings are expert climbers. <i>I eat:</i> Vegetation, seeds and insects. <i>I live in:</i> Japan, Korea and east China. <i>My endangered level is:</i> Least concern</p>	<p><i>Name:</i> Humboldt Penguin <i>Latin name:</i> Spheniscus Humboldti <i>Interesting fact:</i> Named after the Humboldt current. <i>I eat:</i> Fish, anchovies and squid. <i>I live in:</i> West coast of South America from Chile to Peru. <i>My endangered level is:</i> Vulnerable</p>
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<p><i>Name:</i> Kune kune Pig <i>Latin name:</i> Sus Scrofa <i>Interesting fact:</i> An unusual feature of these pigs is a pair of tassels under their chin called Piri Piri. <i>I eat:</i> Grass, fruit and vegetables. <i>I live in:</i> New Zealand <i>My endangered level is:</i> Domesticated although came close to extinction in the 1970s</p>	<p><i>Name:</i> Brown pale-fronted Capuchin Monkey <i>Latin name:</i> Cebus Albifrons <i>Interesting fact:</i> Named after a monk. <i>I eat:</i> Fruit, nuts and seeds. <i>I live in:</i> South America; Bolivia, Brazil, Colombia, Peru, Ecuador and Venezuela. <i>My endangered level is:</i> Least concern</p>	<p><i>Name:</i> Shetland Pony <i>Latin name:</i> Equus Caballus <i>Interesting fact:</i> In the winter they have a double thick coat that not only keeps the pony warm but also keeps out rain and snow. <i>I eat:</i> Grass, hay and seaweed. <i>I live in:</i> Shetland Isles <i>My endangered level is:</i> Domesticated</p>
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<p><i>Name:</i> Degu <i>Latin name:</i> Octodon Degus <i>Interesting fact:</i> Its fifth toe is small with a nail, rather than a claw, on the forefeet. Its hind feet are bristled. Its cheek teeth are shaped like figures-of-eight. <i>I eat:</i> Grasses, leaves and seeds. <i>I live in:</i> Central Chile <i>My endangered level is:</i> Least concern</p>	<p><i>Name:</i> Treecreeper <i>Latin name:</i> Certhia Familiaris <i>Interesting fact:</i> Walks up tree trunks looking for food. <i>I eat:</i> Insects, spiders and seeds <i>I live in:</i> The British Isles and Europe <i>My endangered level is:</i> Least concern</p>	<p><i>Name:</i> Rabbit <i>Latin name:</i> Oryctolagus Cuniculus <i>Interesting fact:</i> Gestation lasts from 28-30 days <i>I eat:</i> Grass and other plants <i>I live in:</i> The British Isles and western Europe <i>My endangered level is:</i> Domesticated</p>
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<p><i>Name:</i> Red Fox <i>Latin name:</i> Vulpes Vulpes <i>Interesting fact:</i> There are usually 4-5 young in a litter born between March and May <i>I eat:</i> Rabbits, birds, voles, mice and some insects <i>I live in:</i> Northern Hemisphere <i>My endangered level is:</i> Least concern</p>	<p><i>Name:</i> Roe Deer <i>Latin name:</i> Capreolus Capreolus <i>Interesting fact:</i> The male is called a Buck and the female a Doe <i>I eat:</i> Leaves, grass, berries and fungi <i>I live in:</i> The British Isles and Europe <i>My endangered level is:</i> Least concern</p>	<p><i>Name:</i> Badger <i>Latin name:</i> Meles Meles <i>Interesting fact:</i> Badgers homes are called sets and may be used for many years <i>I eat:</i> Young rabbits, earthworms, land molluscs, insects, plants, nuts and grass <i>I live in:</i> The British Isles and Europe <i>My endangered level is:</i> Least concern</p>
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<p><i>Name:</i> Hedgehog <i>Latin name:</i> Erinaceus Europaeus <i>Interesting fact:</i> The sharp pointed spines combined with the ability to curl into a ball gives considerable protection against predators <i>I eat:</i> Insects, slugs, beetles, earthworms, snails and vegetable matter <i>I live in:</i> The British Isles and western Europe <i>My endangered level is:</i> Least concern</p>	<p><i>Name:</i> Grey Squirrel <i>Latin name:</i> Sciurus Carolinensis <i>Interesting fact:</i> The first litter consists of 3 young and subsequent litters 5-6 young <i>I eat:</i> Acorns, hazelnuts, cones, fruit, bulbs, roots, shoots, fungi and grain <i>I live in:</i> Introduced into Great Britain from America in 1876 <i>My endangered level is:</i> Least concern</p>	<p><i>Name:</i> Stoat <i>Latin name:</i> Mustela Erminea <i>Interesting fact:</i> In southern England the fur remains the same throughout the year but in the north in winter it becomes white. <i>I eat:</i> Rabbits, rats, mice, perching birds, pigeons and game birds. <i>I live in:</i> Northern Hemisphere <i>My endangered level is:</i> Least concern</p>
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<p><i>Name:</i> Pygmy Goat</p> <p><i>Latin name:</i> Capra Hircus</p> <p><i>Interesting fact:</i> The full-barrelled body shape is a natural feature and not a sign of obesity or pregnancy.</p> <p><i>I eat:</i> Leaves, twigs, some weeds and grass</p> <p><i>I live in:</i> Senegal through Central Africa to southern Sudan</p> <p><i>My endangered level is:</i> Domesticated</p>
